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2 A Note from our Patron



Since the establishment of the scholarship scheme in 2008 and my involvement as Patron, I fondly remember our Round 1 Students' 114 applications coming from 17 schools totaling \$550,695. In my first speech, I encouraged all the students to 'dream big'. In 2021, applications have increased to 2,014 from 326 schools totaling \$3.66M. The reports coming in from schools indicate that many of these students go on to higher learning and definitely dream big to achieve their career goals. The Trust Fund established through the balance of the Stolen Wages Compensation Scheme was initially valued at \$33M, and utilising only the interest portion of these funds, QATSIF has distributed \$18M. The Trust has grown to just under \$45M.

With the increase in applications, this also broadens the knowledge about the Stolen Wages to generations of young people who may never know about the racist policies of the past. I have kept in touch each year at Graduations to continue to be a voice for the people impacted by these policies but to also persuade you all in your endeavours to be your best.

The Board of QATSIF have worked diligently and consistently over the many years under the leadership of Chairperson, Cindy Shannon to consolidate the future of these scholarships. I was honoured to speak at Cindy's Farewell Dinner on 25 November 2021, and recognised her enormous contributions in creating a program that is sought after by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and schools throughout Queensland, Cindy brought her strength as a proud Ngugi woman, a descendent of the Quandamooka peoples combined with her high academic achievements to build from scratch a very efficient and well run scholarship scheme. I have no doubt that many walls would have been hit in building a scheme that needed to satisfy so many different players. I wish you all the best, and you go forward with my blessings.

The support I receive from the Secretariat lead by Michael Nayler and his staff go far in ensuring my continued involvement. I appreciate the challenges they have faced this year in re-locating their offices and the additional workload this causes but throughout all this, they still delivered the scholarships program for our schools.

4 Farewell to our QAISIF Chair



On QATSIF's 13th Anniversary (November 25, 2021), we held a special dinner to thank Professor Cindy Shannon AM who retired as our QATSIF Chairperson after 13 years of dedicated service to QATSIF and Queensland's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people.

Professor Shannon had been the Chair of QATSIF since our foundation by the Queensland government on November 25, 2008.

Despite many genuine community concerns about the Queensland government using unspent Stolen Wages reparations funds to set up QATSIF, Professor Shannon saw the potential in supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people with their senior studies.

Over the past 13 years, Professor Shannon's strength, passion and vision has led to over 14,300 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people being approved for a QATSIF Scholarship to assist with the financial costs of completing their senior studies.

QATSIF is forever grateful to Professor Shannon for her foresight, commitment and energy in supporting QATSIF's development through from our early days to being a leader in First Nations scholarships. Across the evening, Professor Shannon's passion for education and many achievements were recognised by many speakers including:

I will never forget her giving the "Because of her, we can" NAIDOC speech with her granddaughter cradled in her arms. Being her ever humble self, she was busily apologising, while the rest of us were thinking how blessed we were to be witnessing the living embodiment of "Because of her, we can".

With the biggest, most loving heart, Cindy has always remained humble and focused on others. Her passion and care for all young people, but especially our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people is palpable. She lives and breathes to see others succeed."

QATSIF is blessed to still have Professor Shannon's passion, wisdom, and strength to guide our vital misson in building tomorrow's leaders.









6 Our Governance

8 From the Public Trustee



It is my great pleasure to provide a foreword to the 2021 Annual Report of the Queensland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Foundation (QATSIF) and report on their success.

In QATSIF's inception year, 2008, the Trust Fund held close to \$33 million of initial capital to be preserved. In the 13th year - 2021 - the total value of QATSIF has grown to just under \$45 million.

Over the years, shrewd investment in the Trust Fund has increased its value allowing many more students to benefit from the scholarships. In the first round of offers in 2010-11, 114 students from 17 schools received scholarships, worth a total of \$550,695. In 2021-22, this has grown to 2,014 students from 326 schools, sharing in \$3.66M

We know that supporting education is an important step in giving young people choices about their ongoing education and future careers and that scholarships offered to students can reduce the financial pressure on their families. Past research with school staff and members of Indigenous communities tells us the QATSIF scholarship program also encourages and supports cultural pride and confidence among students who are successful, and each scholarship represents a great achievement for the recipient.

It is great news that in 2022-23, 1,911 students from 323 schools will benefit from a total of \$3.49M provided by the Trust Fund.



Professor Shannon's 13 years of leadership has resulted in QATSIF supporting more than 12,400 students to complete their high school education. I wish success for all QATSIF's successful scholarship recipients in their final years of high school. I know that you will go on to do great things.

10 Our Board of Advice

The Trustee is assisted by a Board of Advice, providing strategic direction for the Foundation, and advising the Trustee on the application of scholarship funds.

PROFESSOR CINDY SHANNON AM (CHAIR)

Professor Shannon AM is a proud *Ngugi* woman and a descendant of the *Quandamooka* people. She has made a significant and extensive contributions to health policy including working on maternal, foetal and infant health in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities including dealing with difficult issues such as drug and alcohol abuse and homelessness.

Professor Shannon brings to the Board her experience in the community as an educator, her extensive network within the sector, and views of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People in rural, remote and urban settings.

MRS JANE CEOLIN (DEPUTY CHAIR)

Jane is an Aboriginal woman with cultural and traditional connections to Far North Queensland. Through her mother and father's connections, Jane is of the *Wulgurukaba* and *Yirrganydji* peoples. Jane has worked with a diverse range of teams across key stakeholder groups including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community members to build and sustain effective partnerships and networks. She was appointed to a leadership role at Australian Catholic University in August 2012 and from December 2012 became the Acting Director of the Centre for Indigenous Education and Research. She was appointed as Director, First Peoples and Equity Pathways Directorate, ACU in December 2014.



MR MARK BRAND

Mark has worked with privately owned and publicly listed companies in Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria, as well as closely with Government for more than 20 years. He is a broadly experienced manager with strategic and operational experience in technical, consulting, human resources and not-for-profit sectors.

He has visited and engaged with a number of Aboriginal communities, particularly on Cape York since 2004 and seeks to contribute towards improved educational outcomes and the growth of the Foundation.



MS KELLIE MCDONALD

Kellie McDonald is a young Aboriginal woman whose Mob is *Mandandanji* from Roma. She was a QATSIF Scholarship Recipient in Round 2. After graduating from Alexandra Hills State High School, Kellie completed a Bachelor of Health, Sport and Physical Education degree at the University of Queensland. She is now a teacher at the West Moreton Education and Training Centre. Through her commitment to education, Kellie continues to motivate, educate and inspire Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander students to improve their academic results, cultural knowledge and overall physical and mental wellbeing.

Kellie is the first former QATSIF Scholarship Recipient to be appointed to the QATSIF Board of Advice.



MR KENNETH JAMES (JIM) WALKER

Jim Walker was born in Rockhampton and is a descendant of the *Iman* and *Goreng*Goreng peoples of Central Queensland.

He has extensive experience in working for both Queensland and Australian government departments and agencies. Up until January 2015, Jim had worked for more than 7 years in the Office of Indigenous Engagement within CSIRO and in this position his responsibilities included increasing the engagement of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander trainees, cadetships and internships in science and encouraging Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to take up studies in Science and Mathematics.

As part of his career, Jim has also been engaged as a lecturer at the University of Queensland, the Australia Catholic University and the University of Canberra in Indigenous Studies.

MR BRENTON BOWEN


Brenton Bowen who was born in Cairns and raised in Hopevale, is a proud Guugu Yimithirr man.

Brenton excelled in both sports and his studies as a boarder at St. Teresa's College, Abergowrie. At the age of 17, he signed his first contract with the North Queensland Cowboys and made his NRL First grade debut at the age of 19. His career in the NRL spanned 8 years and saw him play for North Queensland Cowboys and the Gold Coast Titans.

After retirement from football, Brenton worked for 10 years in the Department of Human Services. He is currently working for IUIH as a Deadly Choices Ambassador.

Brenton also encourages students who have aspirations of becoming professional athletes to gain a tertiary education or trade, as professional sport does not last for ever. He strongly believes that having tertiary qualifications or a trade is very important to set you up for life after professional sport.

Mission

QATSIF has been established to support the education of First Nations young people in Queensland.

History

QATSIF was formally launched on the 25th of November 2008 with a deed signing ceremony and announcement of the Board of Advice Members at Queensland Parliament House.

QATSIF was established with principal funding of \$25.8 million from the former Aborigines Welfare Fund and unspent monies from the Indigenous Wages and Savings Reparations Scheme.

Donations and interest earned on the capital funding are used to provide scholarships for Years 11 and 12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people in Queensland.



14 Our Students

QATSIF works with Queensland secondary schools from across State, Catholic and Independent sectors, who then liaise with students, their families and the wider community to provide QATSIF Scholarships to eligible Year 11 and 12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders.

Engaging families is fundamental to the success of our program, and ensures that each student understands the source of their scholarship funding, is committed to making the most of this opportunity, and has the support from family and community members to help them achieve their Year 12 Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) or Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement* (QCIA – * for students with a verified disability).

In order to be awarded a scholarship, students must demonstrate consistently high school attendance, diligence in achieving positive academic outcomes, cultural pride, school participation and the prospect of achieving a QCE or QCIA* (* for students with a verified disability) by the end of Year 12.

Enhancing cultural pride is one of the aims of our QATSIF Scholarships. QATSIF uses every opportunity possible to remind QATSIF students of the often harsh working conditions of their Elders and Ancestors who have made today's QATSIF scholarships possible. Students are reminded that past injustices continue to cause pain and that today's Scholarship Recipients through their academic efforts and outcomes can make their families, Elders and communities proud.

QATSIF delights in our QATSIF students confidently communicating the richness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture through the creative arts and in many other cultural activities.

QATSIF Creative Arts-Competition

In 2021, QATSIF held our 4nd annual QATSIF Creative Arts Competition for Year 7 – 12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from across all Queensland schools. QATSIF is proud to celebrate our deadly students' talents across all endeavours including the Creative Arts.

Each year the number of students entering our competition continues to grow. In 2021, we had 72 entries. As well as many visual arts entries, it was deadly to showcase poetry, ceramics, music, dance, weaving, mask making, sculpture and story-telling.







Tomorrow I am going to meet my older siblings for the first time, and I am so excited. I was sad to leave them. I wish they did not have to go through what they went through. We all are safe and happy now, that is all that matters.

I have started high school now and I was so excited to try out for the netball team. I went to the netball try out and as soon as the other girls saw me, they gave me weird looks just because of the way I was born. They told me to go home but I was not going to just give up, so I practised and practised every day after school.

I walked to the netball grounds to show the coach what I could do but he ignored me. I started to shoot some hoops like I did at home, and they all were stunned by what I could do.

I did not realise I was that good at netball, I thought my Aunty was saying that because she loves me. They had to



THE WAY WAY

The first time I wrote to you and your team looking after the QATSIF scholarships I was a Year 10 student who had just arrived at my new school, Mt. Alvernia College in Kedron after living for many years in Toowoomba.

It was hard to change schools and cities midway through the year and there were times when I thought that finishing year 12 with a new community was too hard. But I knew I had to keep trying...both of my Nanna's didn't get the opportunity to complete their education due to their Indigenous heritages and they had made so many sacrifices to support their kids (including my parents) and us grandkids with our schooling. It was important that I just kept trying. I'm also a big sister and aunty, so I had to make a good impression on my sister and nephews.

I was proud when my teachers at Mt. Alvernia encouraged me to apply for a QATSIF scholarship. I was sad and angry to learn that my Elders were treated so unjustly by successive government policies and not remunerated fairly for their hard work. I was also shocked to learn that so many in my school community and wider circle of friends don't know about this stage of our nation's history.

I applied for a scholarship and was successful. My Nannas especially were so proud of me.

For the past two years I have worked hard at school and received passing grades for all subjects. I have also managed to complete a Certificate II in Health Support Services and a Cert III in Allied Health Assistance with the Mater Hospital. I am currently completing a Cert III Child Care worker qualification as a Traineeship and will be finished mid this year. Also, the manager of the childcare centre where I am training offered me a job for this year. That was great news as I love working with the little kids and a couple of them started calling me Aunty so now they all do! Even those migloo kids haha!

I have so many options for my future and I wanted you and the QATSIF team to know that my scholarship has really supported me with school and boosted my self-esteem. I also know that you and the team would have spent many many hours working on the scholarships and giving up you own time, so thank you.

I'll be finishing high school as a confident Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander woman and emerging leader and will continue to spread awareness of the QATSIF program in community for those who follow. Thank you Aunty Ruth and QATSIF Team for believing in me.

45 | See I.T. Be I.T. Initiative

There is a huge digital divide between students who can afford technology and those that can't. QATSIF, ACS (Australian Computer Society), P&Cs Qld, Substation33 and LiteHaus International are working together to try to help to close this gap.

The See I.T. Be I.T. initiative aims to get refurbished laptop and desktop computers into the hands of some of Queensland's most economically disadvantaged students and families.

We want disadvantaged students to See I.T. (ie. have access to it) and Be I.T. (ie. develop the skills needed to use technology in their future careers).

We have begun approaching schools and businesses who are replacing their current devices and asking them to donate them to help students who otherwise couldn't afford a device. Our friends at Substation33 and LiteHaus International will refurbish these devices and then we will provide them for schools to give to struggling families.

In 2021, we had 374 devices (worth around \$112,000) donated by schools and businesses to support young people.

As part of the project, Substation33 is also providing real life I.T. training to help to get more young people into I.T. careers. ACS have been working hard to connect these young people with businesses that need their skills.


QATSIF Scholarships Awarded Over Time




QATSIF Students by Sector Over Time Rounds 1-12












QATSIF Students by Sector Rounds 1-12



QATSIF Students by Region Rounds 1-12






50 2020-21 Financial Summary



During the 2020-21 financial year, a net amount of \$2,142,861 (2019-20: \$1,942,744) was paid in scholarship payments to eligible students. Comprehensive Income for the year ending 30 June 2021 resulted an income of \$4,177,682 (2019-20: Loss of \$1,264,406).

The Foundation's total expenses for the 2020-2021 year represented only 1.34% of funds under management, which is slightly higher than the previous year (2019-20: 1.33%), but with significantly more scholarship students.

2021 Investment Performance

The investment strategy for the QATSIF is reviewed on an annual basis in conjunction with advice from Queensland Investment Corporation Limited (QIC).

The strategy is designed to achieve the QATSIF stated investment objective to "maximise income while maintaining the real capital value of the funds after taking into account the effects of inflation".

The investment strategy for the Foundation is developed in consultation with QIC. The investments of the Foundation are held in the Public Trustee Growth Trust.

The investment objective of the Trust is to provide a fully diversified investment strategy for those seeking long-term income and capital growth.

The funds have been invested in the Australian Foundation for Charitable Trusts since June 2021.


