

Wishing you all the best for an exciting and hopefully better year ahead.



This year, we asked our students' parents to present them with their certificates on stage.












































Transurban Paiabun Karumba STEM Scholarships

See I.T. Be I.T. Initiative

There is a huge digital divide between students who can afford technology and those that can't. QATSIF, ACS (Australian Computer Society), P&Cs Qld, Substation33 and LiteHaus International want to try to help to close this gap.

The See I.T. Be I.T. initiative aims to get refurbished laptop and desktop computers into the hands of some of Queensland's most economically disadvantaged students and families.

We want disadvantaged students to *See I.T.* (ie. have access to it) and *Be I.T.* (ie. develop the skills needed to use technology in their future careers).

We have begun approaching schools and businesses who are replacing their current devices and asking them to donate them to help students who otherwise couldn't afford a device. Our friends at Substation 33 and LiteHaus International will securely wipe and refurbish these devices and then we will provide them for schools to give to struggling families.

In 8 months, we have already allocated **540 devices** donated by schools and businesses to support young people in South East and North West Queensland. In Term 2, we are hoping to direct devices to the Bundaberg and South Western Queensland areas.



The purpose of the Deadly Rockets program is to help to inspire Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people into one of the fastest growing career sectors.

Kick start your future at a one week residential program for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander high school students.


If you are in Year 10, 11 or 12 and want to know what it's like to be a uni student at JCU: James Cook University, Australia, this program is for you!
