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Welcome to QATSIF's Term 2 Newsletter

This term has been a challenging one for schools, families and especially our Year 11 and 12 students.

QATSIF would like to congratulate our wonderful schools and their dedicated staff for all of the additional work it took to support students and their families across these challenging times.

In response to the COVID-19 challenges QATSIF has:

- ★ Waived the \$300 limit on purchasing an IT device to assist students and their families.
- ★ Written to state and federal ministers and the Education Department outlining our concerns about WiFi access for students especially in remote and rural locations. We have received assurances from all parties that these students were being catered for. We helped to connect some remote and rural schools with Education Queensland to organise WiFi access for their students.
- ★ Asked schools to hold off contacting Elders to endorse their schools as being worthy of support for our Round 12 QATSIF QCE Scholarships. Our Elders' health and safety must come first.
- ★ Advised schools to take COVID-19 restrictions into account when looking at absenteeism and achievement for students' applications and claims.
- ★ Created QATSIF Ambassador Q&A sessions to help Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students refocus on their studies and future careers.
- ★ Begun working with USQ on producing a Graduation livestream and recording.
- ★ Moved our QATSIF staff to working from home to keep and their families safe and healthy.

In amongst all of the challenges, there have also been a couple of really positive developments due to the COVID-19 restrictions which we hope will set up our QATSIF students for even greater success:

- ★ Our QATSIF Ambassadors have started their online Q&A sessions for students. This is something that we didn't even consider before.
- ★ Our QATSIF students have experienced online learning, teleconferencing and adapting to new challenges in a way that previous seniors haven't. Hopefully, this will set them up for success in our ever-changing world, especially as more tertiary institutions move to remote learning.



This week we have had numerous lunch time activities to celebrate Reconciliation Week at our school. Reconciliation week coincides with significant historical dates such as Sorry Day, 1967 Referendum Day, Flag Day

and Mabo Day. It is a good time to educate our staff and students on the importance of these events and what they mean to us in terms of moving forward together.

Torres Strait Flag Day, 29 May 2020

"The Torres Strait Islander flag was designed by the late Bernard Namok Senior from Thursday Island. It was the winning entry in a design competition, held as part of a Cultural Revival Workshop, organised by The Islands Coordinating Council in January 1992. The flag was officially presented to the people of the Torres Strait at the sixth Torres Strait Cultural Festival on 29 May 1992." On Torres Strait Flag Day, we take pride and admire the cultural significance of this important date. We celebrated this day through the following activities:

- ★ Flag raising ceremony, where our long serving staff member Ms Betty Namok, the daughter of the late Bernard Namok, raised the flag at the front of our school.
- ★ Weaving activities on the Language and Culture Centre deck with special guest Aunty Manna from St Paul's community.
- ★ Sharing the history of Reconciliation Week and the meaning behind the colours of the Torres Strait Flag
- ★ Fun photos with different people while holding a Torres Strait Flag cushion
- ★ Lunch time Reconciliation week volleyball match between students and staff
- ★ And finally a whole school aerial drone photo gathering around a large Torres Strait flag.







Ipswich Girls' Grammar School

On Monday 1 June our QATSIF students decorated the Teacher's Staffroom with some Indigenous students' work and then served up Morning Tea to the teachers with Native Food supplied by Game Enough. The staff dined on emu, kangaroo, chicken or vegetarian yapa, wattle seed cheesecake, shaved crocodile brioche buns and kangaroo salami just to name a few.

At lunch the girls worked on an activity with the other students. The students traced their hands and wrote, "What Reconciliation meant to them" and these were then placed all around the school.

Immediately on their return to school after working from home, the team got together to discuss how they could get the message out about these significant events, while still adhering to COVID-19 restrictions.

Within a short timeframe, the students put in a fantastic effort to produce a Reconciliation Week video, which was viewed by the whole school in their classrooms during normal assembly time. Currently, they are working on a couple of projects: planning a video for NAIDOC Week, along with workshop sessions for EALD students to introduce them to Indigenous history and culture, and a QATSIF information session for Year 10 Indigenous students.

Transurban Paiabun Kurumba STEM scholarship

QATSIF has been working on a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Scholarship in partnership with Transurban for the past few months. Transurban are offering their Paiabun Kurumba STEM Scholarship to five high achieving QATSIF Year 11 STEM students in the Ipswich/Logan/Brisbane regions surrounding the Logan Motorway.

Paiabun Kurumba is "Dream Big" in the Yuggera language.

As well as continuing to receive their Round 11 QATSIF Scholarships, these Year 11 students will receive:

- ★ An additional \$500 to spend on an IT device eg iPad or laptop
- ★ Work experience opportunities with Transurban Queensland in technology and engineering
- ★ Access to mentoring, tutoring and career coaching

with Transurban Queensland

- ★ Visits to Transurban Queensland's offices, construction sites and state-of-the-art traffic control centres
- ★ Tunnel maintenance experience go behind the scenes to see what it takes to maintain and operate a road tunnel
- ★ Invitations to Transurban Queensland networking and career development events.



Round 12 QATSIF QCE Scholarships

QATSIF's 12th Round of QCE Scholarships are open for applications from all Queensland schools. They close on Friday, August 7.

Schools need to make sure that eligible students and their parents/carers have completed their Applicant Declarations.

An Indigenous Elder/Organisation CEO is also asked to complete the Endorsement and Approvals form to endorse that the school is worthy of support.

Please note:

- ★ Be careful risking Elders' health with the current COVID-19 restrictions. We have suggested holding off until these restrictions are lifted.
- ★ The Elder/Indigenous Organisation CEO is endorsing the school as being worthy of support, they are not being asked to endorse individual students or confirm their Aboriginality.

ATSIAP Challenge December 2019

In late Term 4 2019, two of our students, Ethan Naylor and Tianah Barker, successfully participated in the State Finals of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Aspirations Program (ATSIAP) Challenge.

ATSIAP forms the middle stage of the Solid Pathways program targeting students in year 8 and 9 with a purpose of raising students' expectations of themselves as learners and enhance post-school aspirations to include tertiary pathways.

Our team was one of two chosen from the North Coast Region to attend the ATSIAP State Finals. The task undertaken for our team to reach the Regional selection was to develop a multimodal presentation to argue the topic that All students in Queensland State Schools should have the opportunity to learn a local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Language. The hard work and contribution of Imogen Hervey was pivotal in our team gaining regional selection.

Unfortunately, Imogen was unable to participate in the next phase of the challenge and Tianah Barker joined the team.

Despite challenges of the make-up of the team, Ethan and Tianah were able to meet the other challenges of the program that included:

- a. The development of a persuasive speech around the theme of Voice, Treaty or Truth. Our Team chose the topic "The history of our First Peoples is the histories of all Australia and hearing it is necessary before true reconciliation can be achieved".
- b. The long term challenge for the term leading up to the state finals involved them thinking as entrepreneurs and to create an environmentally and socially sustainable business idea that could be operated from a regional, rural or remote area and prove its commercial value.

During the state finals, Ethan presented the team's persuasive speech and was amongst the many articulate voices who gave compelling arguments in the competition. Due to the issues with the team composition over the year, Ethan and Tianah did not fully complete the long term challenge but were able to competently present what they had achieved. For their efforts in persisting with the challenge under difficult circumstances, our Team was awarded the *Spirit of ATSIAP Award*.



The statewide finals also include several short-term challenges, including mathematics and engineering challenges, general knowledge quiz and the arts. At the end of the 2-day residential experience our team achieved First Place in the Mathematics Challenge; Third Place in the Improvisation Challenge as well as the Spirit of ATSIAP Award.

Our congratulations go to Ethan and Tianah for their efforts, persistence and achievements with the challenges over the year.


Our competition will be judged over the school holidays by a panel of judges including past QATSIF students, staff and Board Members.






