Dear QATSIF students, families, schools and supporters,

It's hard to believe that we are already half-way through 2022. This year seems to be racing past.

In July and August, we will again hold our QATSIF graduations after having them largely cancelled due to COVID over the past two years. Our QATSIF Patrons, Board and team all very excited about once again celebrating our deadly graduating students' achievements. We have sent invitations to our schools and hope that many QATSIF students' families will be able to join our celebrations.

Aunty Ruth, our much-loved Patron is hoping to join us at our QUT graduation and we will record her words of encouragement to be shared at our other graduations.

It seems strange having our graduations so early, but of course with the change to external exams, our Year 12s have very limited time in term 4 and most of this must understandably be devoted to achieving their best results.

This term we opened our 14th QATSIF Scholarship Round and our 5th QATSIF Creative Arts Competition. Our Creative Arts Competition has attracted over 83 entries so far, which is our biggest number of entries to date. We are also expecting that our 2023 Scholarship round will be the biggest yet. We may even break the 4,000 OATSIF students mark in 2023.

QATSIF had an extended Reconciliation Week celebration this year with our Deadly Rockets visit to Cairns and Thursday Island and our Mabo Day celebrations. There will be more on these deadly events later in our newsletter.

We wish all of our QATSIF students, especially our 2,000 Year 12s the best for their final semester. As Aunty Ruth, our Patron says:

QATSIF celebrates NRW, Mabo Day and Torres Strait Flag

On Mabo Day Friday 3 June, QATSIF celebrated Reconciliation Week with a strong Torres Strait Islander focus on Mabo Day and the 30th Anniversary of the Torres Strait Islander flag.

Our celebration was beautifully led by our deadly MCs, Jaxon Lester (Robina SHS) & Kaylee Haspels (St Mary's College, Ipswich).

Associate Professor Marcus Waters, Griffith University's Dean of Indigenous Teaching and Learning led our Acknowledgement of Country and shared a powerful message on Cultural pride with all.

We thank the talented students from Brigidine and Ambrose Treacy College who performed a powerful welcome dance to begin our celebrations.

Much respected Elder and long-time QATSIF supporter, Uncle Barry Watson lit our QATSIF Elders' candle on behalf of all Elders present.

To highlight the Reconciliation Week theme, "Be Brave. Make Change", everyone present was given a paper hibiscus flower on arrival. They were invited to write a word about their commitment to reconciliation or gratitude for Eddie Mabo's legacy on the flower and to bring it forward during the ceremony.

The paper flower petals were folded over but opened to reveal the message when they were placed in camp ovens filled with water by participants. This was to highlight that we need to "Be Brave" and be open to help to "Make Change" and Reconciliation happen.

During the ceremony, Keenan Burns who travelled from Concordia College shared a moving poem on the life of Eddie Mabo.

Professor Cindy Shannon AM, QATSIF's Co-Patron and the first Indigenous Pro Vice Chancellor of Griffith University, spoke to the students about the sacrifices of previous generations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Elders and Ancestors, especially those affected by the injustice of Stolen Wages.

Rikki Regelling, a past QATSIF student, proud Torres Strait Islander woman and current Griffith University student invited students to take up the many opportunities that they are given in order to achieve their dreams.

At the end of the ceremony, the Elders present were presented with QATSIF mugs featuring artworks created by students in QATSIF's Creative Arts Competition. Mr Samay Zhouand (the Public Trustee of Queensland) and Professor Shannon presented the students with a wrist band and a specially designed book mark to encourage them to remember the important messages from the celebration.

Uncle Milton Walit, a much-loved Torres Strait Islander Elder finished our beautiful ceremony by blessing all present.

QATSIF Round 14 Scholarships

QATSIF's 14th Round of scholarships officially opened at the end of May. We are expecting more than 2,000 applications this year.

Our QATSIF online portal is open for schools to submit any Round 14 QATSIF applications up until **5pm Friday**, **August 5**. Our P-10 and 7-10 feeder schools have a separate form that is emailed back.

We also wanted to share a couple of hints to help schools with their applications:

- ★ Please remember that if you decide to pull apart a form into separate pages that it needs to be put back together and submitted as a single PDF form.
- ★ The Endorsement form (completed by an Elder or Indigenous CEO) is to endorse your school as being worthy of support and is not completed for each student.
- ★ The QCIA form is only completed by a school when applying for a QCIA student with a verified disability. All other students must be QCE eligible.
- ★ A Confirmation of Aboriginality form is only required if students have not previously identified as being Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander on your school's records and present asking for a QATSIF Scholarship. If in doubt, please contact us.
- ★ Year 11 students with a two-year QATSIF scholarship do not need to reapply as their scholarships carries over into Year 12.

Deadly Rockets School Visits

Thanks to the Chief Scientist of Queensland for providing our Emerging Science Grant for our Deadly Rockets visits to Cairns and Thursday Island schools. We are also grateful to Viva Energy Australia for supporting our inspirational student speakers to join our trip.

Across the week, around 700 students from Djarragun College, Woree State High School, Balaclava State School, Tagai State College and Sacred Heart Primary School took part in our STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) spectacular.

Our team from QATSIF, It's Rocket Science Adventures and James Cook University worked to inspire students from Prep to Year 12.

The students moved through three different activities:

- ★ Rocket Science and Aerospace session with Cran Middlecoat, an ex-commercial pilot and owner of It's Rocket Science Adventures.
- ★ STEM session with JCU staff and other special guests. In Cairns, Orr Thomason ran an exciting engineering session with the support of JCU Student STEM Ambassadors. On Thursday Island, medical students T'kido Titasey and Tish Sivagnanan generously gave their time to speak about their medical careers and to do some First Aid training.
- ★ Rocket launching with Mike Nayler (QATSIF) who helped the students to launch over 1,600 air powered water rockets. The record rocket flight was over 110m.

From October 17 to 21, we will be offering schools in the Bundaberg, Gladstone, Gayndah, Murgon and Kingaroy region an opportunity to experience our Deadly Rockets program.

Barry Doyle Scholarship students meet the QIFVLS Board

This scholarship will support Year 11 QATSIF students who have an interest in a future career based on providing a safe, positive environment for Indigenous families (e.g. law, counselling, social work, community development etc.).

QIFVLS will fund these students' QATSIF scholarship and provide opportunities for them to work with and learn from First Nations professionals.

QATSIF thanks the deadly Queensland Indigenous Family Violence Legal Service team for offering this opportunity to our students.



QATSIF Ambassador Lunch Time Q&A Teams sessions

During Semester 2, we are hoping to again offer Teams sessions with some of our many outstanding QATSIF Ambassadors and other guest speakers.

Once again, our sessions will be open to all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and other interested students (not just QATSIF students) to hear inspirational guest speakers talking about their educational journeys and how they came to choose their current career or studies.

Our sessions have tended to run for 45 min with two or three guest speakers followed by an open Q&A sessions with schools. Schools can either choose to join in the online discussions at the time or listen to the recording afterwards.

Our first session will be from 12:30pm-1:15pm on Friday, July 22 featuring Katrina Wruck, a Torres Strait Islander Chemistry PhD student and Juliet Biemann an Aboriginal Law student.

QATSIF thanks the Australian Catholic University (ACU) for supporting our Yarning With Our Elders project.






QATSIF Young Achievers

Josiah Corowa





From hundreds of applicants, Josiah successfully secured one of six positions with the leading electrical contracting company who he had undertaken work experience with during his senior year.

Work experience provides invaluable insight for students according to Corinda's Vocational Education Training (VET) Coordinator, Karina Doolan who helped Josiah secure the opportunity that would cement his chosen pathway after school.



"We received positive feedback from JPR after Josiah completed his work experience so it was no surprise when JPR advertised job opportunities with us that he applied," Ms Doolan said. "In prep for his interview, we practiced aptitude tests and I advocated for him on several occasions. At school, Josiah was an outstanding role model to younger Indigenous students and actively contributed to the school's cultural pride."

In return, Josiah is full of praise for Ms Doolan's assistance. "I received a lot of guidance from her. I wasn't sure where to start my job search but with her help and my interest in the electrical industry having completed a Certificate II in Electrotechnology in Year 11, I had options to pursue," the 2021 QATSIF Young Indigenous Leader Award winner said.

JPR views the partnership between schools and industry as essential. Industry can provide real world experiences and support students to achieve their pathway goals according to Deb Fox, JPR's WHSE Manager / Apprentice Training Manager. "Communicating early about our apprenticeship offering means we can be involved in setting students up for success to obtaining an apprenticeship," Ms Fox said.



"In the electrical space, it is so important that teachers, students and parents understand what an industrial electrician actually does, what an employer is looking for, the career pathways available and the academic requirements to ensure success," she said.

While waking up at 5am has taken some adjustment, Josiah is relishing the transition from school to full-time work. Throughout his electrical fitter mechanic apprenticeship, he will learn how to build, repair and maintain the electrical infrastructure for overhead, underground and water infrastructure.

His advice to students looking at future pathways – "Don't be afraid to ask for help. There are people who can help you look for a job, prepare for an interview or even help you decide which path you want to take. There's always someone there to support you. You just have to ask."




Selwyn Cobbo

As well as enjoying the many fun and exciting activities, the girls were put into teams of 5 to create a case study using the information from the many guest speakers. The idea was to create a pitch to increase the rate of participation of First Nations Peoples in the 2032 Brisbane Olympics.

Abigail said, "I am so glad that I was able to attend this as I got a better understanding of what business is and what types of careers are out there. It was a big eye-opener to see all the possibilities. It helped me to understand what it could be like to be when I graduate from school."

Mackenzie said, "My overall experience was amazing. I gained insights into the business world and the range of things I could do. I was able to see people exactly like me doing what I wanted to do, and that for me, put everything in perspective. It allowed me to see that my dream was in reach and that there was a whole community behind me cheering me on."


St Mary's College (Maryborough) Student Ambassador




Tagai State College




