# Welcome to QATSIF's Term 3 Newsletter

QATSIF has received over 1,900 applications for our Round 13 Scholarships since they opened on May 31. The number is a little down from our record 2,030 applications last year and we were wondering if this could be a sign of some COVID-related fatigue for our students, families and schools.

Sadly, COVID restrictions meant that most of our graduations and our planned trip to meet with Cape York communities at the Laura Festival had to be cancelled.

We were very lucky that we managed to still hold our Townsville and Cairns graduations with a mixture of good luck and the kindness of JCU and some of our Cairns schools.

Shalana, from our QATSIF office had been visiting some of her family in Cairns when the SE Queensland COVID lockdown was called. Despite being in Cairns with no equipment, certificates etc. between Shalana and Mike (in Brisbane) and with the support of JCU, St Monica's College and Cairns State High School we managed to run both our Townsville and Cairns graduations. We would particularly like to thank Nikki Strano (JCU), Jennifer King (St Monica's College) and Mark Harland (Cairns State High School) for their wonderful support.

QATSIF has been blessed to have Professor Cindy Shannon AM as our QATSIF Chairperson since we started nearly 13 years ago. We will farewell Professor Shannon with a special recognition dinner on Thursday 25 November which is also QATSIF's 13<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Across Professor Shannon's time as Chair, QATSIF has supported over 14,300 young people with their senior studies. We can't thank Professor Shannon enough for the huge difference she has made to so many young lives.

We are looking forward to an exciting final term ahead and wish all of our 1,600 QATSIF graduates the best as they plan for their futures. As Aunty Ruth says, "Dream Big!".

# **Narangba Valley State High School**

Congratulations to the deadly students and staff of Narangba Valley State High School who celebrated the 2021 NAIDOC Week theme, 'Heal Country'.

As a school community, they called for respect to be given to the spiritual, physical, emotional, social and cultural needs of this precious land that we all call home.

Narangba Valley SHS paid tribute to the rich heritage and culture of the *Gubbi Gubbi* people, the Traditional Owners of the land on which their school was built.

The school's Indigenous Support committee offered activities for students to help to recognise, protect and maintain Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture. Activities included: hand painting a mural, re-vamping the Bush Tucker Garden planter boxes, creating a chalk walk near the Administration building, an excursion for some of the Indigenous students to QAGOMA, and the making of Indigenous art pieces at lunch time.

NAIDOC 2021 has left its mark on Narangba Valley SHS with a memorable mural and two planter boxes celebrating the importance of the land and the rich culture of the *Gubbi Gubbi* people.



# **Caloundra State High School**

Caloundra State High School's seniors and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students worked with a local artist, Mr Kahl Noy to create an artwork that represented their school, community, the Traditional Owners of the land – the *Gubbi Gubbi/Kabi Kabi* people and the animals who call this place home.

Mr Noy also treated the students to some story-telling, place name meanings and explained the meaning behind this year's NAIDOC week theme, *Heal Country*.

The students were thoroughly engaged and have done an amazing job creating their beautiful artwork. Our QATSIF recipients and future QATSIF students were involved in the planning and painting of this artwork. To celebrate the unveiling of their artwork and the school's appreciation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, culture and connection to Country, parents, students, community members and staff were invited to a special NAIDOC week BBQ.

The BBQ provided an opportunity to unveil the artworks and have a yarn with each other over a sausage sizzle.

A special guest, Traditional Owner, Kerry Neil from *TribalLink* shared the most amazing Welcome to Country. There was also a representative from the Sunshine Coast First Nations' Group, Kerry Turner who operates *Murris on the Move*.

Caloundra SHS are thankful to have wonderful community members to support their students.




# **Craigslea State High School**

Craigslea State High School celebrated NAIDOC Week with a beautiful ceremony. As usual Uncle Dennis was present and delivered a PowerPoint presentation through art work of the Indigenous Culture and History from the early settlements in Australia to the present day (from the Hidden Histories Training).

The students participated in drawing, painting and telling the story of the Rainbow Serpent to connect to Healing Country.

Craigslea's Aboriginal students presented a film of how our curriculum incorporates Indigenous perspectives in the teaching and learning at the school through interviews with teaching staff and students.

The celebration concluded with a luncheon with Uncle Dennis, school staff (including the Principal – Mark Farwell), the students and their parents/carers, invited guests from the community, Regional Education Office and Deadly Choices.





# **Marymount College**

In Week 1, the Marymount Mob were proud to conduct a NAIDOC Assembly for the whole school. Mob students used this time to talk about the origin and purpose of NAIDOC Week, and the importance it holds in the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander calendar each year.

They explained the sacred connection that First Nations' people have with their Country, and that because of this, NAIDOC's *Heal Country* theme had a two-fold meaning. On the one hand referring to the restoration, protection, and preservation of Australia's physical land, waterways, plants and animals, and on the other hand, calling for healing of our First Nations' peoples as a necessary first step towards healing our nation.

In keeping with the theme, the Mob set up a Healing Tree in the library, and invited students and staff to add a leaf to the bare branches. The response was so great that the tree outgrew its display board, completely laden down with leaves covered with patterns, drawings, and heartfelt messages of support. The Healing Tree idea was also adopted by the Year 9 pastoral classes who designed their own artwork to represent the *Heal Country* theme.





# **Moranbah State High School**

### Monday - Traditional Games on the oval

Students played *Ida/Idor* on the oval during Lunch break. *Ida/Idor* is a traditional Indigenous game played on the Torres Strait Islands and Northern Queensland.

# The Star of Taroom Walk

The Marymount Mob were moved by the story of the **Star of Taroom** and its return to country during NAIDOC Week. Although they were not able to join the walk in real time, the Mob decided to make our own symbolic journey and be a part of this historical milestone in spirit.

Over two weeks, the Mob invited Marymount College's students and staff to join them in walking laps of the oval each lunchtime, recording the distance covered each day and charting their progress on the way to reaching the goal of 500km.

After a slow start, the number of walkers – and kilometres – increased each day, and by the end they not only reached our goal, they smashed right past it! With the generous support of dozens of staff and hundreds of students, they not only made it from Brisbane to Taroom, but back again, with a grand total of 1,067km!

As the walkers symbolically crossed the traditional lands of the *Turrbal/Yuggera*, *Jinibara*, *Gubbi Gubbi*, *Wakka Wakka*, *Wulli Wulli*, and *Auburn Hawkwood* people, they reflected on the spiritual journey that had initially inspired them, and celebrated the generosity of the College community who had come together to honour the significance of the Star's return to its rightful resting place.













# **Cultural Burn at Taabinga Station** — *Heal Country*

As a culminating activity to NAIDOC Celebrations, Indigenous students in Year 7, 8 and 9 from Nanango State High School were invited to attend a Cultural Burn at an iconic station on *Wakka Wakka* country. Murri Rangers facilitated the event and highlighted the importance and cultural significance of the burning. Students had a great day being empowered by the Rangers.

A big thank you to the owners of Taabinga Station and the Murri Rangers for creating this most worthy cultural experience for our students.



# See I.T. Be I.T. Initiative

There is a huge digital divide between students who can afford technology and those that can't. QATSIF, ACS (Australian Computer Society) and Substation 33 want to try to help to close this gap.

The See I.T. Be I.T. initiative aims to get refurbished laptop and desktop computers into the hands of some of Queensland's most economically disadvantaged students and families.

We want disadvantaged students to *See I.T.* (i.e. have access to it) and *Be I.T.* (i.e. develop the skills needed to use technology in their future careers).

We have begun approaching schools and businesses who are replacing their current devices and asking them to donate them to help students who otherwise couldn't afford a device. Our friends at Substation 33 will refurbish these devices and then we will provide them for schools to give to struggling families.

By the end of term 3, we had already had 600 devices donated by businesses and schools.

As part of the project, Substation 33 is also providing real life I.T. training to help to get more young people into I.T. careers. ACS have been working hard to connect



these young people with businesses that need their skills.

# Transurban Paiabun Kurumba STEM Scholarship

In Term 4, current Year 10 students from the Brisbane, Ipswich and Logan regions who have applied Round 13 QATSIF Scholarship can also apply for a Transurban Paiabun Kurumba STEM Scholarship.

The Transurban Paiabun Kurumba (Yuggera: Dream Big) STEM Scholarship was created to help to give students a taste of where an interest in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) could take them. It will also provide these students with a front row seat into the inner workings of one of the world's largest toll road operators.

In addition to their Round 13 QATSIF Scholarships, these students will also receive (depending on COVID restrictions):

- ★ An additional \$500 to spend on an IT device or peripherals.
- ★ Work experience opportunities with Transurban Queensland in technology and engineering.
- ★ Access to mentoring, tutoring and career coaching with Transurban Queensland.
- ★ Visits to Transurban Queensland's offices, construction sites and state-of-the-art traffic control centres.
- ★ Tunnel maintenance experience go behind the scenes to see what it takes to maintain and operate a road tunnel.
- ★ Invitations to Transurban Queensland networking and career development events.

Application forms will be sent out to schools within Transurban's region in Term 4.



# Queensland Ambulance Service School Based Scholarship

The Queensland Ambulance Service School Based Scholarship is available to **current Year 10 students** with an interest in working for the Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) and who have applied for a **Round 13 QATSIF Scholarship**.

In addition to receiving a QATSIF QCE scholarship of \$2,000 (funded by the QAS) over a two-year period to assist with your educational expenses, you will also receive (depending on COVID restrictions):

- ★ \$300 towards driving lessons
- ★ Funding towards gaining a First Aid Certificate
- ★ access to mentoring and career coaching through the QAS.
- ★ opportunities to experience what a career in the QAS could look like.
- ★ if possible, visits and work experience at local QAS centres.

# Yarning With Our Elders

One of our greatest gifts is our Elders' incredible wealth of knowledge, wisdom, strength and experience.



QATSIF (Queensland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Foundation) in partnership with ACU (Australian Catholic University) is inviting all Queensland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander secondary students to yarn with, learn from, and share the stories, wisdom and cultural heritage of our Elders.

Over Term 4 and the Christmas holidays, we are inviting students to yarn with an Elder and record one important aspect of their life. Some examples could be:

- What was it like growing up in their local community?
- Their Stolen Generations or Stolen Wages story.
- · What is their advice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people?
- Important local traditional language words, their meaning and pronunciation.
- mportant local traditional stories, dances, technology or history.
- What did they learn from their own Elders?

Students are invited to share their Elder's story using any appropriate media eg. video, voice recordings, essay, poetry, music, interviews etc. Preferably, presentations should be less than 10 minutes or 5,000 words in length (or equivalent).

ACU will assist with collating and preserving these important stories for future generations and offer prizes for outstanding entries. All entries will be recognised with a certificate.
