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New Recipients' Celebration - Australian Catholic University

Over 120 of our 1045 new QATSIF QCE Scholarship recipients gathered at the Australian Catholic University recently to celebrate their scholarships.

Just over 300 guests were treated to performances by male and female Aboriginal dance troupes from Ambrose Treacy College, Indooroopilly and Mary MacKillop College, Nundah.

Aunty Maroochy Barambah, a renowned actress, author and operatic singer, welcomed those gathered to her Turrbal lands with a stirring rendition of *Advance Australia Fair* in language.

QATSIF's patron, Aunty Ruth Hegarty, the author of "Is that you, Ruthie?" and many other books, spoke to those gathered about her deep pride in the many achievements of QATSIF's students. She commended QATSIF's tireless efforts in changing the lives of around 7,300 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students across the past 9 years.

Aunty Ruth who is a major figure in the campaign for the return of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander wages stolen by successive Queensland governments between the 1890s and 1970s, spoke about her tremendous pride in QATSIF's efforts to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people.

As a QATSIF community, it is important to remember that much of QATSIF's funding comes from the interest on unallocated "Stolen Wages" compensation monies held in trust by the Queensland government.



The QATSIF students speaking at our event all paid tribute to the hardship, sacrifices and great gift provided by both our Elders and particularly those who had their wages stolen.

Out of the 36 schools present, 23 students received QATSIF leadership badges to recognise their election to school leadership roles including a number of College Captains and Vice Captains.

The scholarship ceremony concluded with the presentation of QATSIF certificates and an inspirational speech by twin QATSIF graduates, Amanda and Chantelle Martin who spoke about the difference that a QATSIF scholarship had made to their lives. Both Amanda and Chantelle are currently studying dual Law degrees at Griffith University in Brisbane.

Throughout 2018, QATSIF will hold a number of events for its students at universities across Queensland. We look forward to meeting our QATSIF students from across the state at these events.

QATSIF Graduates, address - New Recipients' Celebration - ACU Banyo

As a QATSIF graduate, I would in particular like to acknowledge the hard work, struggles and ongoing pain of those Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Elders and Old People who had their wages stolen by our governments over many generations.

My name is Chantelle, and I am Amanda, and we are both proud to be delivering this speech as ex QATSIF scholarship recipients. Our people are the Gadigal mob who are the traditional custodians of Sydney.

To begin with, I would like to reiterate just how special it is to be a QATSIF scholarship recipient. Each and every one of you have worked very hard and I'd like to congratulate you on your efforts so far.

When Amanda and I were presented with our QATSIF scholarships in 2016, we were in our final year of study at the Brisbane School of Distance Education. We were living in Airlie Beach, which is in North Queensland. As our mother is a single mother, it is often difficult for her to afford things other than necessities. However, being a QATSIF scholarship recipient meant that the pressure on her to pay school associated costs was lightened, and she was able to afford for us to travel to the 2016 QATSIF scholarship presentation.

Attending the 2016 presentation was an eye-opening experience for me. I was able to meet special guests, such as Auntie Ruth Hegarty and speak to other students

about their plans for university. As a non-OP student, I was nervous about how I would gain entry into my desired course. I applied for my first preference through Griffith University's direct entry program, run by the Gumurrii centre.

Being a QATSIF scholarship recipient strengthened my application and complemented my results and extra-curricular activities. In October 2016, I was successfully offered a place in my current double degree, a Bachelor of Law and a Bachelor of Government and International Relations, majoring in Politics and Public Policy.

There are obvious educational advantages in being a QATSIF scholarship recipient, however I'd like to also acknowledge the personal advantage I experienced as a recipient. I noticed a significant growth in my self-confidence after attending QATSIF events, which I attribute to being in new social situations. I also developed a passion for giving back in any way I can, and currently my way of doing this is inspiring, mentoring, and educating other students across the Gold Coast through my part time role as an Academic Personal Trainer, or in other words, a tutor.

I will forever be grateful for the assistance QATSIF provided me, and hope that everyone here takes advantage of the opportunities that are available to them as a QATSIF scholarship recipient.

Two years ago, I was in your shoes and mainly focused about graduating and getting into university. I was unaware of just how many benefits come with being a QATSIF recipient. Today, I am going to tell you about the success that I have had since receiving a QATSIF scholarship.

I currently study Law and Commerce at Griffith University and am about to begin my second year.

As a result of my hard work at university, I was offered a 12 week full time internship with CareerTrackers. CareerTrackers creates paid internship opportunities for Indigenous uni students and has over 100 corporate partners. CareerTrackers is a program that has changed my life and also has the power to change your life.

This summer I did an internship at the Brisbane Airport Corporation in their Strategic Planning team. This was a dream come true for me because I have wanted to work for an airport since I was 10 years old. I never thought that

my first corporate role would be my dream job. I completed my internship two weeks ago and have since been offered part time employment with Brisbane Airport during the semester. This is a job I have always wanted and it proves that hard work and determination really pays off.

One of the most rewarding parts of my internship was being able to bring my culture into the corporate world and participate more actively in the community. Being active in the community is a great way to give back to those that have helped you and inspire those that are younger.

As QATSIF scholarship recipients, there are so many opportunities out there for you. Many of these opportunities were not available when your parents went through high school or university, so it is important that you take every opportunity with both hands and make the most of them. But most importantly, make sure you say thank you today. Thank your teachers for nominating you, thank your parents for the sacrifices they make and thank your friends for supporting you.

It has been a busy start to the year, but nothing compared to the busyness that you experience every day out in our schools.

Having the opportunity to step back away from schools after 31 years, has bought into sharp resolution the amazing work that educators do every day. I know that I am preaching to the converted, but there can be few careers both as challenging and rewarding as education.

In 2018, we have an additional 1045 QATSIF QCE Scholarship recipients across the state. It is a slightly smaller year for us with the smaller cohort of Year 11s generally across the education system.

I am amazed with the incredible work and difference such a small QATSIF team do in looking after nearly 2300 scholarship holders each year. It may surprise you to learn that in 2018, QATSIF for the first time, has 3 full-time equivalent staff. 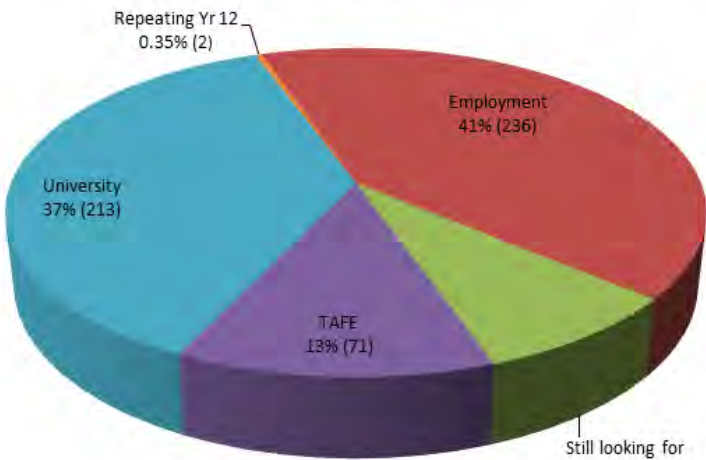
QATSIF QCE Scholarships get results

Each year, QATSIF collects data from our schools on the post-school destinations and QCE Completion rates of our QATSIF QCE Scholarship recipients.

As this is done shortly after the completion of Year 12, we acknowledge that students listed as "Still looking for work or study" may have moved into a career or study after the survey was completed.

Our 2017 QATSIF QCE Scholarship data shows that 96.6% of our QATSIF QCE Scholarship graduates received their QCE, compared with 88.6% of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and 94.6% of students in Queensland. (Source: QCAA data)

Comparison data:

- In 2013, 36.6% of 20 year olds in Australia were attending university. QATSIF graduates – 37%
- The Jan 2018 unemployment rate for young people in Queensland is 13.3%. QATSIF graduates still looking for work or study – 8.4%

Earlier this month, our Education Minister, The Hon. Grace Grace MP dropped through for a lunch meeting and took the time to enjoy the beautiful art works on display.

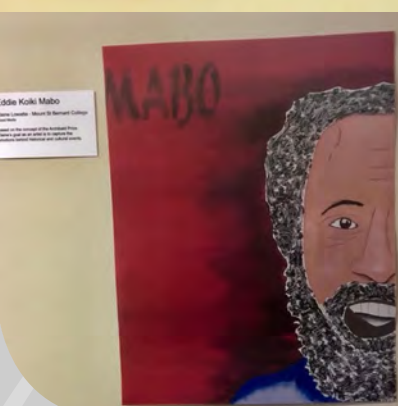
We have also had visits from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander teams from a number of universities and

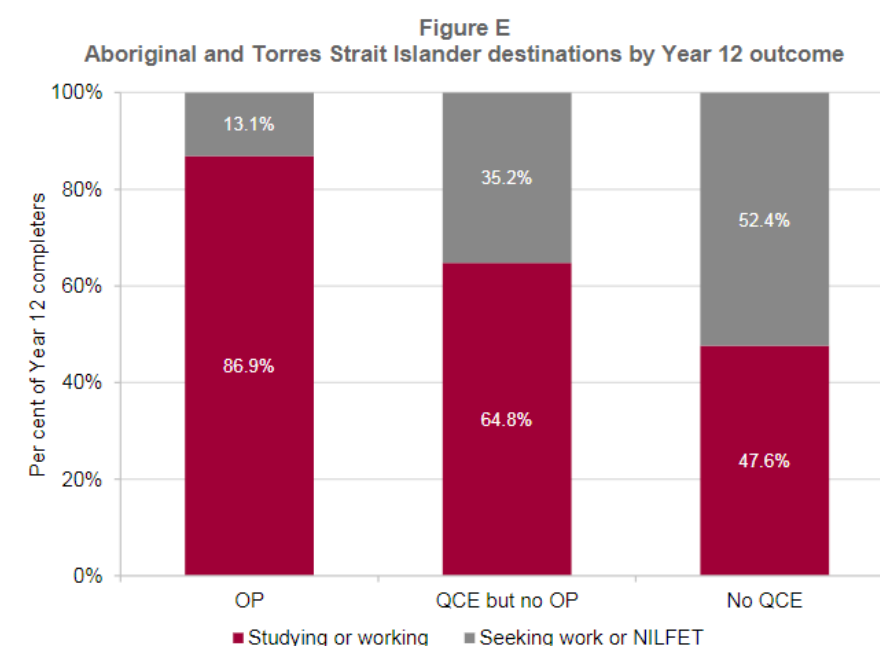
QATSIF would encourage our schools to have a look over this report from the Queensland Audit Office. The link to the report is provided below.

Just one of the many useful statistics in this report is the difference that education makes to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students as shown in the graph below.

Queensland's overall Youth unemployment rate for January 2018 is 13.3%. This varies across the regions from just 5.9% in inner city Brisbane up to 62% for Outback Queensland.

Our QATSIF QCE Scholarship supports Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to gain their QCE. This raises their chances of future employment and study from less than half to almost 2/3rds. NB* Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students who also gain their OP have more than closed the gap on the general population.

Thank you for your great work in encouraging our students to complete Year 12. Your efforts are making a huge difference across the state.
